<i>Juniperus sabina</i> 'Buffalo' juniper	Soft, feathery, bright green foliage on low spreading branches. Excellent groundcover plant for borders or massing. Foliage remains bright green throughout winter.	H 12-15" W 3-5' Zone 3	
<i>Juniperus sabina</i> 'Calgary Carpet' juniper	Durable, low growing, spreading, heat- and drought-tolerant shrub. Attractive soft green foliage. Use in perennial borders, as groundcover, or along walkways. Full sun.	H 6-9" W 6-8' Zone 3	
<i>Juniperus scopulorum</i> 'Wichita Blue' juniper	Attractive silvery blue foliage on a broadly pyramidal form. Excellent as a screen or for use as a specimen in the landscape. Prefers drier climates. Pruning can enhance and maintain the shape.	H 15-18' W 8' Zone 3	
<i>Larix deciduas</i> 'Pendula' weeping larch	Irregularly drooping branches. Soft, fluffy tufts of green needles become brilliant yellow in the fall. Deciduous.	H 8-12' W 10-12' Zone 3	
<i>Larix siberica</i> 'Conica' Siberian larch	Pyramidal type Siberian Larch. Large, bright green needles. Small red cones and gold fall color. Nearly horizontal branches sweep up at tips. Deciduous.	H 20' Zone 2	

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<p><i>Picea abies</i> Hildburghausen Norway spruce</p>	<p>Short, very green needles create a tight, compact appearance. This symmetrical gem works well in the rock garden or small landscape with miniature and other slow-growing plants.</p>	<p>H 4' W 4' Zone 3</p>	
<p><i>Picea abies</i> 'Pendula' weeping Norway spruce</p>	<p>Very hardy, useful, and unique specimen plant. Every plant is unique. Adds artistic appeal to any landscape. Tolerates sun, shade, or partial shade.</p>	<p>H 15' (varies) W 4' Zone 2</p>	
<p><i>Picea abies</i> Norway Spruce</p>	<p>Fast-growing pyramidal tree. Produces bright green needles that turn a glossy, dark green. Adaptable to their environment. Extremely hardy.</p>	<p>H 40-80' W 25-30' Zone 2</p>	
<p><i>Picea abies</i> 'Cupressina' columnar Norway spruce</p>	<p>A narrow and columnar tree. Green needles that remain throughout winter. Fast growing. Withstands snow well. Pruning can enhance and maintain the shape.</p>	<p>H 30' W 10' Zone 4</p>	
<p><i>Picea abies</i> 'Fat Cat' spruce</p>	<p>A rounded form of the birds-nest type of Norway spruce. Has the appearance of a green ball. Extremely hardy. Pruning can enhance and maintain the shape.</p>	<p>H 4' W 4' Zone 3</p>	

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<p><i>Picea abies pumila</i> dwarf Norway spruce</p>	<p>Attractive, globe-shaped evergreen shrub. Spreading habit makes it useful as an informal hedge or landscape accent. Blue-green needles cover dense branches.</p>	<p>H 3-4' W 3-4' Zone 2</p>	
<p><i>Picea abies</i> 'Sherwood Compact' spruce</p>	<p>A narrow, pyramidal Norway spruce. Primarily used as a specimen or for privacy. Pruning can enhance and maintain the shape.</p>	<p>H 15' W 8' Zone 4</p>	
<p><i>Picea glauca</i> 'Pendula' weeping white spruce</p>	<p>Attractive, blue-green foliage on weeping limbs. Strong central leader adds vertical interest. Use as a focal point for a unique landscape. Pruning can enhance and maintain the shape.</p>	<p>H 15' W 4' Zone 2</p>	
<p><i>Picea glauca densata</i> 'Black Hills' spruce</p>	<p>A variant of white spruce. Slower growing, shorter, and denser. Needles are deep blue green. Hardy and adaptable to different soil types. Makes a great hedge.</p>	<p>H 20-40' W 20-25' Zone 3</p>	
<p><i>Picea pungens</i> Colorado spruce</p>	<p>Broad, dense pyramidal tree with stiff branches. Medium growth rate. Grows best in rich, moist soil. Adaptable to different soil types.</p>	<p>H 40-60' W 10-20' Zone 3</p>	

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<p><i>Picea pungens</i> 'Clayton Berg' globe spruce</p>	<p>Forms a globe when young but becomes a broad cone when mature. Maintains blue color best in full sun. Easily trimmed. Developed in Helena, MT. Pruning can enhance and maintain the shape.</p>	<p>H 5-8' W 4-6' Zone 2</p>	
<p><i>Picea pungens</i> 'Blue Totem' columnar blue spruce</p>	<p>A dense conifer with narrowly upright and columnar growth. Attractive bluish-green foliage emerges in spring. Easily trimmed. Pruning can enhance and maintain the shape.</p>	<p>H 15' W 3' Zone 2</p>	
<p><i>Picea pungens globosa</i> 'Dwarf Blue' globe spruce</p>	<p>Forms a globe when young but becomes a broad cone when mature. Maintains blue color best in full sun. Easily trimmed. Pruning can enhance and maintain the shape.</p>	<p>H 5-8' W 4-6' Zone 2</p>	
<p><i>Picea pungens</i> 'Fat Albert'</p>	<p>Superb evergreen conifer with rich blue needles on a densely branched, naturally pyramidal form. Outstanding landscape specimen. A very slow growing, dwarf variety. Pruning can enhance and maintain the shape.</p>	<p>H 25-30' W 15-18' Zone 2</p>	
<p><i>Picea pungens</i> 'Roundabout' spruce</p>	<p>A compact, green, globe-shaped spruce. Very hardy and slow growing. Small needles are in perfect scale to its small size. Full sun and well-drained soil. Pruning can enhance and maintain the shape.</p>	<p>H 3' W 2' Zone 2</p>	

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<p><i>Picea pungens</i> Colorado spruce</p>	<p>A green or blue spruce. Very stately, large, and hardy.</p>	<p>H 60' W 20' Zone 2</p>	
<p><i>Picea pungens</i> 'Sester Dwarf' spruce</p>	<p>Stunning needles, slow growth rate, and classic conical form. Requires little maintenance or pruning. Best in full sun for blue color.</p>	<p>H 6-8' W 4' Zone 2</p>	
<p><i>Picea pungens</i> 'Waldbrunn' spruce</p>	<p>A superb, very hardy dwarf evergreen shrub with blue foliage that emerges silver in spring. Low, mounded form with little maintenance required. Drought tolerant once established.</p>	<p>H 2' W 4' Zone 2</p>	
<p><i>Pinus aristata</i> bristlecone pine</p>	<p>Irregular pyramidal pine with dark green, white-flecked needles. Slow-growing native plant. Drought tolerant. Requires well-drained soil to maintain color. Full sun.</p>	<p>H 23' W 12-15' Zone 4</p>	
<p><i>Pinus cembra</i> 'Westerstede' Swiss stone pine</p>	<p>This beautiful pine represents the finest in hardy garden conifers. Long, luxurious needles give this upright tree a full, fluffy look. Graceful branching, attractive color, and striking cones offer year-round interest and character in a small space.</p>	<p>H 10-12' W 8' Zone 3</p>	

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<p><i>Pinus mugo jakobsen</i> Jakobsen pine</p>	<p>A natural bonsai specimen. Dark green needles against a strong trunk and branch structure needs no human manipulation.</p>	<p>H 4' W 6' Zone 2</p>	
<p><i>Pinus mugo 'La Cabana'</i> mugo pine</p>	<p>A very hardy pine. Will grow into a sturdy, broad, pyramidal form. Thick green needles and large resinous buds.</p>	<p>H 15' W 12' Zone 2</p>	
<p><i>Pinus mugo 'Mops'</i> dwarf mugo pine</p>	<p>A globe-shaped dwarf mugo pine. Does not require candle pruning to maintain its shape.</p>	<p>H 3-4' W 3-4' Zone 2</p>	
<p><i>Pinus mugo 'Valley Cushion'</i> mugo pine</p>	<p>A true dwarf, very compact, dense pine with a spreading habit. Reddish new buds complement the short, medium-green needles.</p>	<p>H 1-2' W 3' Zone 2</p>	
<p><i>Pinus mugo pumilio</i> dwarf mugo pine patio tree</p>	<p>A grafted dwarf version of the species in small tree form. Slow-growing, rugged, and hardy. Maintain shape with pruning. Needs full sun.</p>	<p>H 4-5' W 3' Zone 2</p>	

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<p><i>Pinus mugo</i> 'Tannenbaum' mugo pine</p>	<p>Dark green color. Extremely cold hardy. Adaptable to wide ranges of environmental climatic conditions. Perfectly formed Christmas tree selected from South Dakota. Grows 6-12" per year.</p>	<p>H 10-15' W 6-10' Zone 2</p>	
<p><i>Pinus mugo</i> 'White Bud' mugo pine</p>	<p>A globe-shaped conifer requiring little care to maintain its small stature without candle pruning. Cold weather brings a white resinous coating to the buds, producing a frosty effect against the dark green winter foliage. Highly desirable for rock gardens, entryways, or borders.</p>	<p>H 3' W 4' Zone 2</p>	
<p><i>Pinus nigra</i> Austrian pine</p>	<p>A dense, pyramidal tree with stiff, dark green needles. Maintains shape and does not lose lower branches. Fast growing and tolerant of heat, drought, and urban environments.</p>	<p>H 40-50' W 20' Zone 3</p>	
<p><i>Pinus nigra</i> Austrian pine bonsai /pompom</p>	<p>Bonsai form of Austrian pine. Unique specimens.</p>	<p>H 6-8' W 5-8' Zone 4</p>	
<p><i>Pinus ponderosa</i> Ponderosa pine</p>	<p>Native Montana state tree, which is useful for mass plantings and shelter belts. Thrives under widely different conditions and in many different kinds of soil.</p>	<p>H 50-60' W 20-25' Zone 3</p>	

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<p><i>Pseudotsuga menziesii</i> Douglas fir</p>	<p>Soft, bluish needles making a pyramidal evergreen tree. Grows best in sun and moist soil. Very Hardy.</p>	<p>H 40-80' W 12-20' Zone 4</p>	
<p><i>Thuja Occidentalis</i> North Pole arborvitae</p>	<p>Makes a great screen for narrow areas with its columnar shape. Pruning is not needed. Excellent hardiness and dark green foliage. Resistant to winter burn.</p>	<p>H 10-15' W 5-7' Zone 3</p>
