<p><i>Clematis</i> 'Contesse de Bouchard'</p>	<p>A compact woody vine with leathery textured foliage and a profusion of large, brilliant pink blooms with soft yellow centers. A beautiful flowering groundcover or climber for arbors, fences or onto tall shrubs. An excellent choice for small spaces.</p>	<p>H 6-10' W Varies Zone 4</p>	<p>Photo Credit: Monrovia</p> 
<p><i>Clematis</i> 'Duchess of Edinburgh'</p>	<p>Gorgeous white double flowers. Height is a nice compact 6-8 feet. Can be container grown. To keep roots cool, add a planting in front to provide shade for the roots.</p>	<p>H 6-8' W Varies Zone 4B</p>	
<p><i>Clematis x 'Ernest Markham'</i> 'Ernest Markham'</p>	<p>An award winning and very reliable clematis cultivar valued for its large, open, magenta-pink flowers. Train to climb along trellis, arbor or fencing, or leave unsupported to ramble through medium to tall shrubs. <p><i>Clematis jackmanii</i> 'Jackman Superba'</p>	<p>Showy, deep violet-purple flowers will cover this climbing vine throughout most of the summer. To keep roots cool, add a planting in front to provide shade for the roots.</p>	<p>H 10-12' W Varies Zone 4B</p>	
<p><i>Clematis</i> 'Mrs. N. Thompson'</p>	<p>Compact and free flowering, with deep purple flowers that have bright red central bars. Rebloomer late spring and early fall. Slow grower. To keep roots cool, add a planting in front to provide shade for the roots.</p>	<p>H 8-10' W Varies Zone 3</p>

<p><i>Clematis</i> x 'Multi-Blue'</p>	<p>Produces 4- to 5-inch-wide long-lasting blue flowers with spikey thistle-like centers. Blooms in early summer and re-blooms in late summer to late fall. Fragrant and deer resistant. To keep roots cool, add a planting in front to provide shade for the roots.</p>	<p>H 6-8' W 3' Zone 3</p>	
<p><i>Clematis</i> 'Pink Champagne'</p>	<p>This early-flowering, compact clematis is ideal for containers or small gardens. Festive, deep-pink flowers. Petals are uniquely striped with white bars. Blossoms abundantly in early summer, repeating in late summer to early autumn. Pruning type 2.</p>	<p>H 6-8' W Varies Zone 4</p>	<p>Photot Credit: Donahue Nursery</p> 
<p><i>Clematis</i> 'The President'</p>	<p>Impressively large star-shaped flowers in shades of rich violet-blue, featuring 8 overlapping sepals that are silver beneath. Produces single, purple-blue flowers with red anthers. This vigorous climber has stood the test of time since 1876 and blooms almost continuously from late spring through early fall. <p><i>Clematis</i> 'Warsaw Nike'</p>	<p>A rich velvet reddish purple variety which produces 5" wide open flowers in late May through September. Flowers are composed of six to eight overlapping petals, each deeply grooved along the center. Pruning type 2.</p>	<p>H 6-10' W 3-4' Zone 4</p>	<p>Photo Credit: Donahue Nursery</p> 

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<p><i>Humulus lupulus</i> 'Cascade' Hops</p>	<p>Vigorous perennial vine. Moderately bitter variety is one of the most popular hops for craft brewing. Dioecious (male and female plants separate). Easy-to-grow ornamental plant. Rough stems clad with lobed leaves. Yellow-green male flowers bloom in catkins. Flowers emit a pine-like fragrance and are attractive to butterflies. 4-6% bitterness.</p>	<p>H 10-20' W Varies Zone 3</p>	
<p><i>Humulus lupulus</i> 'Willamette' Hops</p>	<p>One of the best for pale ales, brown ales, or UK-style ales. Also used in teas for insomnia. The vines and fragrant flowers make a sensational statement in any landscape, whether you use the hops to make beer or not. Grow on a fence, wall, or trellis for support.</p>	<p>H 10-20' W Varies Zone 3</p>	
<p><i>Hydrangea anomala petiolaris</i> Climbing Hydrangea</p>	<p>A vigorous climbing vine that clings to surfaces by aerial rootlets. It has a slow growing, shrubby habit until established, then becomes quite vigorous, producing long, fast growing stems. 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<p><i>Lonicera x brownie</i> 'Dropmore Scarlet' Honeysuckle</p>	<p>Long-blooming season (June-Sept.) of showy, tubular flower clusters backed by attractive blue-green foliage. Handsome, vigorous, dense vine for fences or arbors, or even as a groundcover. Long-lasting red berries follow the blooms. Loved by hummingbirds.</p>	<p>H 8-10' W 3-5' Zone 3</p>	
<p><i>Parthenocissus quinquefolia</i> var 'Virginia Creeper'</p>	<p>Fast-growing vine that climbs or trails along the ground. The leaves are compound, containing five leaflets. Leaflets range from 2 to 6 inches in diameter and have toothed margins. Leaflets are red when they first emerge but turn green with maturity. In the fall, leaves turn a bright red to maroon color.</p>	<p>H Varies W Varies Zone 3</p>	
<p><i>Wisteria macrostachya</i> 'Blue Moon'</p>	<p>Blooms in early summer, rests and starts again, sometimes blooms even a third time. No pruning required. Blooms best in full sun. Prefers a sheltered site.</p>	<p>H 15-25 W Varies Zone 4</p>
